Vo-Tech Student Ricky Dye Wins Medal In Competition

Ricky Dye, a student at the Hazard State Vocational-Technical School won first place in the United States Skill Olympics held in Phoenix, Arizona June 24-27, 1986. Anaheim, California. Ricky turned down the job offer planning to go into business for himself in his native Floyd County.
